STAFFING AND INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY CHANGES FOR CHANTRY

SINCE THE FORMATION of the Town Council in 1997, the running of the Council has been undertaken by two members of staff who carry out council decisions, fulfil statutory obligations and liaise with residents. However, it soon became clear that with the Chantry Centre now fully operational an additional pair of hands was needed to deal with the day to day running of the building. The Council is currently interviewing and we hope to have a new member of staff in situ by the end of September.

Another update to the way the Council works is that we are moving our IT to a Cloud based server. This will also give both staff and councillors access to Microsoft 365 and means we can utilise our server room in the Chantry Centre.

NEW LITTER BINS FOR TOWN

THE HEALTH, WELL-BEING and Environment Committee recently decided to replace the Council's old yellow litter bins with smart new ones. You can find them at the following locations -Billericay station (two), Stock Road just before the medical centre, Queens Park on the roundabout by the bus stop and on the junction of Lake Avenue. We'd like to thank **Basildon Borough Council for** installing them free of charge and let's hope they get well used in keeping the town tidy and litter free.



CHRISTMAS LIGHTS

THE TOWN COUNCIL will once again be installing festive lighting in the High Street to brighten up the gloomy winter days and cheer Christmas shoppers. The lights will be on from 25th November until 6th January and we'll also have the large Christmas tree outside the Chantry Centre which is a firm favourite with passers by, both young and old.



HIGH STREET PLANTING

AS RESIDENTS KNOW the Town Council has provided colourful floral displays in the High Street for many years. Earlier this year high sided delivery vehicles knocked several baskets off their brackets causing a serious health and safety risk to both pedestrians and motorists, so the Council took the decision to remove them completely. However, the lamp columns are due to be replaced by Basildon Borough Council which gives us an ideal opportunity to source new, more secure fixings so that the hanging baskets can go up again in 2023. The War Memorial and pavement planters are still presenting a lovely display for shoppers and visitors to the town.

SKATEPARK UPDATE

OFFICERS FROM BASILDON Borough Council were in Lake Meadows on 10th July to consult with residents and park users over their preferred design for the new skatepark. The feedback received was passed to the supplier to improve the designs and at the time of writing this article the finalised designs were awaited. The next stage is for planning consent to be obtained and it is expected that the skatepark will be

installed before the end of the financial year. The hardstanding at the old location is being removed and returned to grass by the Town Council as the new skatepark will be sited alongside the Multi Use Sports Area to the rear of the swimming pool.

The children's play area by the café in Lake Meadows is also scheduled for replacement by Basildon Council and work will be started on that in the autumn.



BILLERICAY TOWN WALKS ARE BACK! SATURDAY 24TH SEPTEMBER – START 2PM AT BILLERICAY STATION

BARCLAYS BANK SESSIONS AT THE CHANTRY CENTRE MONDAYS & WEDNESDAYS AT 9AM – 5PM COMMENCING 31st AUGUST

RESIDENTS MAY BE aware of the High Street bank closures which have caused concern. Due to the concerns raised Barclays Bank has taken the decision to hire space in the Town Council Chantry Centre to ensure a presence in Billericay for at least the next 12 months. This commitment by Barclays has been made to the Government and has been received positively.

During the sessions at the Chantry Centre Barclays will provide facilities for both customers and non-customers to speak with Barclays staff members

and raise financial issues they may have. It is also intended that the sessions will provide residents with an opportunity to learn about digital banking, which is also known as online banking, avoid fraud and look out for scams.

The sessions will take place on Monday and Wednesday at 9am to 5pm starting from Wednesday 31st August. Information will be published in the branch and on Barclays's social media.

The Town Council welcomes this initiative by Barclays as it provides a much needed service to residents and will benefit the community.

Prior to the beacon lighting there was a reading from Reverend Paul Carr followed by a piper playing Diu Regnare and Majesty which was played by a bugler.

DO YOU WANT to set up a new community group? Perhaps a book reading club, support group, knitting circle, or youth group. The Town Council has a new grant option available to help you start. People who give their time to run local volunteer/not-for-profit groups providing activities, clubs and services in Billericay are valuable residents. Using the Chantry Centre to support these groups is one area where Billericay Town Council can make a real difference.

The Town Council already provides grants of up to £500 for community/ not-for-profit groups to spend on capital items but now we have a new initiative: a "Community Startup" scheme designed to support new volunteer groups in their early days.

Room hire in the Chantry Centre to the value of £100 covering the costs of 5 two hour meet-ings or the hall for 5 one hour sessions is available – giving you time to establish your group and funding sources. Starting up a new community group is hard work and one of the most challenging requirements is finding somewhere affordable to meet, often before you even have a bank account. Using our new Chantry Centre facilities allows us to help you "Build Community".



ALLÉE DE BILLERICAY IN CHAUVIGNY

AS YOU CAN see from the signs as you enter Billericay, we have a twin town in France called Chauvigny. We have been twinned for nearly twenty years and this year, on Sunday 8 May, Gérard Herbert the Mayor of Chauvigny and Jeannine Watson from the Billericay Twinning Association (BTA) unveiled a plaque renaming one of the small streets in the centre of the town 'Allée de Billericay.'

Seven members of the BTA were present at the ceremony. This was the first visit to the town for four years because of the pandemic. The guests stayed with families – some have known each other for many years – and were very well looked after. There was a trip to the demarcation line between Vichy France and occupied France which passed very close to Chauvigny. Another visit was to Les Ormes which has a very interesting chateau and also a staging post (a Relais de Poste) set up in the late 18th century for the official mail between Paris and Bordeaux.

BRIGHTSIDE PRIMARY SCHOOL – TREE PLANTING BY THE CHILDREN AND TREE WARDENS NEWS

PART OF THE Billericay Tree Warden's (BTW) remit is to plant the idea of trees and wildlife into the mindset of the young. So we have approached several local schools with a view to undertake a tree planting exercise for the Queen's Green Canopy (QGC) initiative. Although it has been inevitably hampered by the Covid-19 crisis, some headway has been made.

We had been in contact with the Head Teacher Mr Luke Bulpett and Teacher Mr Robert Crouchman of Brightside Primary School and discussed the logistics for 13 classes of 6 to 8 year olds to each plant a small tree within their school grounds on Wednesday 23rd March. So at 15 minute intervals, each class helped to add slow release fertilizer, then compost, plant the tree, carefully tamp about the base, attach the tree guard and stake before asking the Tree Wardens various questions about trees. We then discussed the aftercare required. Labels will be attached to each tree to identify the species and the class that planted it. Chosen species were: Oak; Silver Birch; Rowan: Hazel and a Scots Pine as a feature tree.

The weather and enthusiasm was perfect for such an event. Later we are to give a talk about trees and wildlife at assembly. We have discussed with Luke and Robert that there are other wildlife projects that we could engage the children with. The various tree species were sourced from the Norsey Wood tree nursery. The QGC event was a project run by the BTW's School team who hope to duplicate the project at other local schools. A big thank you to the Brightside Primary School for the hospitality shown to us and arranging the logistics involving 375 children.

News in Brief:-

Responding to the Climate Crisis – The Borough Council is forging ahead with significant tree planting schemes across the Borough. Two further areas that have been identified are at Lake Meadows and at the recreation area by Pleasant Drive. Our ecologist and Tree Warden member Nathan has been called upon to assist in the design of these schemes. **The Pilgrim Fathers** – The BTC and the Tree Wardens planted two cultivar Pilgrim Bramley apple trees in the town to commemorate the 400th anniversary of the sailing of the Fathers to America. These trees were vandalized on two occasions and after affecting a repair were given sanctuary at the ancient burial ground of the Great Burstead Church.
