The Parade will start from the Fire Station and proceed up Laindon Road, across Sun Corner, and up the High Street to the War Memorial where the Remembrance Service will be held.

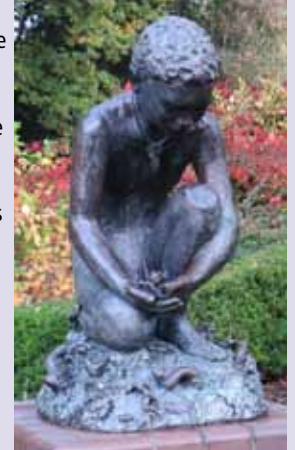
LITTER PICK SATURDAY 9TH NOVEMBER CHANTRY CENTRE 9.30-11.00

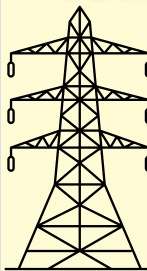

TOWN COUNCIL OBJECTS TO PLANNED PYLONS



IN THE LAST edition of the Town Crier the response to the first National Grid Norwich to Tilbury Pylon Consultation was published. The following response was submitted by the Town Council regarding the second Consultation in July. The Town Council has raised significant concerns regarding the detrimental impact to Billericay as follows:

NORWICH TO TILBURY CONSULTATION FEEDBACK SECTION G: BASILDON AND BRENTWOOD

VISUAL IMPACT

- This power line will be visible from most of the west of the town because Billericay is higher than the route. The route goes through a special area of Greenbelt which is the first unspoilt Greenbelt as you leave London without housing, or any industrial buildings. This historic landscape is unchanged for centuries.
- The pylons will be visible from the station in the centre of town and from Sun Corner at the end of the High Street. Billericay town centre is a Conservation Area, and this pylon route will have a detrimental effect upon that status.
- The area to the west of Billericay provides open vistas from the town which enhance the amenity of residents and need to be preserved. This area is of great visual importance and as residents of Billericay we will be deprived of the aesthetic beauty in this part of the Town by these pylons.
- There are many fine viewpoints within the town that give views over open countryside to the west that will be despoiled by this power line.

DISRUPTION TO THE COMMUNITY

- There will be major traffic disruption in the Town especially over the 4-5 years estimated construction phase caused by the delivery of materials and construction traffic.
- The extended construction phase will involve creating access roads for construction traffic utilising existing roads as well as creating new access routes across existing agricultural and open land. Most of these existing roads such as Old Church Lane and Buttsbury Wash are very narrow and unsuitable for construction vehicles or heavy plant but are nonetheless heavily used by local traffic which will be disrupted and delayed.
- There are major concerns around vehicle capacity and the vast increase in traffic alongside much larger construction vehicles on already congested roads. London Road (A129) will become a pinch point for construction traffic and there has been no consideration of the impact of additional future planned developments/construction sites (as listed below) near the A129 and the pylon route.

PLANNED DEVELOPMENT SITES AROUND THE A129 LONDON ROAD

- 19/01725/OUT – Land north of London Road – 480 new homes
- 24/00004/OUT – Land south of London Road – 130 new homes
- 24/00479/FULL – Land west of Heath Close – 65 retirement apartments
- 24/00762/OUT – Land west of Laindon Road – 250 new homes

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT

- The pylon route runs down the western side of Billericay and through Billericay Marshes which is an undeveloped and undisturbed green area full of wildlife.
- This area is also on the existing flood plain of the River Wid which already has serious existing issues with flooding on a regular basis and is the main reason the area has remained undeveloped. It is noted that pylons TB198, TB199 and TB200 are to be positioned in this area which would seem unwise given the instability of the location? Damage caused through the construction phase risks causing irreparable damage to the river and its eco systems.
- Billericay Marshes is an area full of wildlife with 46 distinct species of birds recorded along with a variety of insects, bats, other mammals and reptiles. The construction of pylons here would cause considerable habitat damage to the marshes.

ALTERNATIVE OPTION TO PYLONS

It is the view of the Town Council that the power cabling should be routed under water from the wind farm along the Thames Estuary to the Tilbury site. Alternatively, underground cabling should be deployed. Both these alternatives should be formally and thoroughly assessed prior to final decisions being made. Both have the considerable advantage of causing minimal damage to the environment or disruption to the lives of our residents.

EXTRA CHRISTMAS LIGHTS FOR HIGH STREET

FOLLOWING THE INTRODUCTION of a new scheme last year the Christmas Lights working party has taken on board residents' feedback, and earlier this year met with the contractors at their storage premises to look at what could be done to further enhance the scheme.

We are increasing the amount of string lights on each lamp column and adding additional icicle lights along the front of more High Street premises. As there are large gaps between lamp columns in various parts of the High Street the aim is to try and light up as much of the High Street as possible.

The decoration in the Sun Corner beacon basket was felt to be underwhelming so we have commissioned a larger, bespoke decoration that it is hoped will make much more of an impact. Also the tree at the War Memorial was pollarded at the end of September which means it's able to be decorated again.

The lights will be lit from Friday 15th November and we hope that all our residents enjoy them.



HIGH STREET PLANTING

NO FLORAL DECORATIONS have been placed on the lamp columns for the last few years due to high sided vehicles dislodging the old style of baskets. This was hazardous to both pedestrians and vehicles so the Council decided not to have hanging baskets due to health and safety concerns. However, lots of people really missed the colourful floral displays so this year the Town Council installed pole baskets. These are more secure and require minimal watering as there is a large reservoir at the base of each basket.

Although the lamp columns only have colour in the summer the War Memorial and High Street planters are tended all year round to bring colour to the High Street whatever the season. The Town Council is also pleased to advise residents that we are installing a planter outside Santander to stop people parking on the pavement and blocking the sightlines for those vehicles exiting the public car park.

BILLERICAY'S ROMAN PAST ARCHAEOLOGICAL INVESTIGATION KENNEL LANE SITE 18TH JULY 2024

SINCE OUTLINE PLANNING has been granted to build 179 homes on land bounded by the A176 to the east and Kennel Lane to the north, the developers, Hill Partnership, were required to arrange a pre-construct Archaeological Investigation.

On 18 July councillors and interested residents were invited to visit the excavation and take part in an interactive archaeological experience. This proved to be an enlightening insight into the Roman history of Billericay. The Billericay School site, the Billericay School Farm site, (now Bell Hill Close) and the Kennel Lane site once formed part of a Roman settlement.

Professional archaeologists from the Cratus Group were on site explaining the process for excavating and determining the origins of the artefacts found. There were examples of: Roman pottery, coins, buttons, lead shot, part of a badge, a thimble, parts of amphora and Roman roof tiles. Other artefacts included animal bones, evidence of pottery kilns and ancient drainage systems. If human remains were found the teeth would be forensically examined as strontium isotopes in teeth help determine the country of origin.

During Roman times wheat was grown in the area which was transported to Europe. Most recently the Kennel Lane site was farmed by a tenant farmer and the last crop was hay.

The site has been mapped using GPS and metal detectors have been run over the site. The investigation will not affect the planning process as the finds are not of historic significance but the site has been mapped for posterity.

The official Archaeological Report will take up to six months to complete as all the artefacts have to be analysed and recorded. It will then be published in the Essex Journal.

FOCUS ON CHANTRY CENTRE HIRER – PHOTOFOLD CAMERA CLUB

LAKE MEADOWS TEEN PLAY AREA GETTING A MAKEOVER

TO ENSURE OUR Teens can continue to use the popular play equipment in Lake Meadows the Town Council has given the go ahead to a major refurbishment. This investment by the Town Council was agreed unanimously at the July Full Council meeting and will ensure this equipment is in good order for the continued enjoyment of all.

Following extended negotiations, once the refurbishment is complete, Basildon Council have agreed to undertake ongoing monitoring and maintenance of the equipment for the next five years.

“YOU CAN NEVER HAVE ENOUGH STORAGE”

SO WENT THE most frequent piece of advice when the Town Council were researching other venues as part of the design process for the Chantry Centre. Taking into account our budget we built in as much storage as we could and over the past 3 years it has served well.

Rather than ferry equipment back and forth, many of our most frequent community hirers rent space in our store room. However, we've now reached full capacity. With continued healthy interest amongst groups for regular bookings and strong revenues still well ahead of what we'd originally budgeted we're now planning to increase the space available.

We aim to do this by creating a mezzanine floor in the store room, taking advantage of the high ceilings and existing support steels. This should increase the amount of usable space significantly – perhaps by 60% and make the centre even more attractive for long term hirers. It's early days yet; we're in the process of getting designs and final quotes – but we'll keep you updated as the project progresses.



BEACON LIGHTING TO COMMEMORATE D-DAY 80

ON 6TH JUNE 2024 the Town Council lit the beacon to honour those whose bravery and sacrifice on D-Day 80 years ago gave us our freedom today.

The commemoration began with a parade by RAFAC 2393 (Billericay) Squadron, the Billericay Detachment ACF and local scouts and guide groups. Our Chairman Cllr Mark Thomas gave a speech welcoming everyone to the event, then our Vice Chairman Councillor Jim Devlin spoke about Trooper Leonard Kemp from Billericay who was killed during the landings. He was only 20 years old.

Youth Town Councillors George Wood and Alex Tomov read the International Tribute and we were honoured to have both the Citizen of the Year, Dave Sweet and the Young Citizen of the Year Sophie Vaidya light the beacon together.

A bugler played the Last Post, followed by a 2-minute silence and then Reveille.

The Town Council would like to thank everyone that took part including the uniformed organisations, and all those who helped with the equipment and preparation for the event. We would also like to thank all the residents that came along to join us in this very poignant commemoration.

WOODVALLEY – BILLERICAY'S FIRST VINEYARD

AS MANY OF our green spaces are under threat from housebuilding it is refreshing to learn about a project which is conserving this land for a new and biodiverse purpose.

Located on Outwood Common Road, Woodvalley Vineyards is the result of the entrepreneurial skills and risk taking of four local residents with the vision to lease 17 acres of farmland on the hillside overlooking south Billericay. Kevin, Keeley, Alison and Jay, whilst self-confessed beginners, have thrown themselves into learning about organic viticulture and can be found most weekends tending their vines.

Now into their third year of planting they already have 1500 vines growing both Pinot Noir and Chardonnay grapes, which thrive in our Essex soil. Further planting will take place this spring to double the size of the vineyard. Over time, the aim is to expand and eventually harvest commercially viable quantities of grapes.

With a mission to also improve biodiversity on the site they are already removing 0.9 tonnes of Co2 from the atmosphere.

Both the soil and climate in the South East of England are incredibly well suited to growing Chardonnay, Pinot Noir and Pinot Meunier grapes because they allow for a long, slow ripening season.

PLANNING COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN REPORTS UPSURGE IN RESIDENTS ATTENDANCE

Councillors agree such participation in the consultation process is welcomed as objections add substance to and are frequently mirrored by the Planning Committee's own analysis of speculative developments.

As a further example, following a request from residents, the Town Council has written to Basildon Council requesting that all comments on planning applications are shown on the Planning portal.

In view of the increased interest in the work of the Planning Committee, the Town Council would appreciate it if residents who wish to attend future Planning meetings let the Town Clerk know in advance.
